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## Mayor's Message: Embracing Unfinished Borough Business

### Conundrums

If there is anything to mark a capital” C “in conundrum, it would clearly be issues like Heather Lane, damage to Lake Creighton, the legacy landfill, re-use of the former Presbyterian Church , the need for senior housing, flood control and other initiatives. So many of these public projects are interlaced with a myriad of issues that unfortunately stall progress on them. This dynamic is uncommon in the business world. Funded projects usually incorporate



a distinct alpha and omega paradigm.

### Progress

On the flip side, progress has been made with other projects. These include improving our parks and playgrounds with new trees, recreational equipment and soon, a full replacement (drop in place) bathroom at Mountain View Park. The Borough has benefited from an extensive road paving program this year. And the streetscape work along Route 28 is close to completion.

The Borough is also planning to sell surplus property in order to yield much-needed revenue. And a historic move was the successful purchase of a former service station with the vision of expanding and enhancing our beloved Victor Crowell Park. In addition, the new grocery supermarket, Superfresh, opened its doors recently which provides a good fit where the previous Pathmark occupied. New sanitary pump/ lift stations have also been installed around town.

Substantial progress has been made regarding the elimination of our sanitary sampling station on South Ave. with the goal of a permanent pump station on Baekeland Ave for the Borough to collect the sanitary fees directly from the industrial and commercial users rather than the revenue going to Piscataway Township.

We have hired and already in the process of hiring more police

officers to get to the budgeted number of 32 officers, the number Chief Geist determined as “full employment,” all this in the name of public safety.

After much fanfare by the EPA along with other environmental organizations, the Borough finally received the previous Middlesex Sampling Plant parcel back from its contaminated Superfund days. It is now cleaned to “residential standards”, the highest in living quality standards. The purchase price was one dollar. However, we are restricted to use the property only for municipal support and emergency purposes. Si planning is under way to relocate our Public Works, Emergency Management, Fire Department offices and our fueling station, which is currently behind Borough Hall. Post-land transfer testing will be conducted and independent testing will be encouraged.

## **On the Drawing Board**

Among some other projects worth

mentioning which have not yet gotten off the drawing board or are in the initial stages are the community garden to be located at Mountain View Park, updating Borough Hall and seeking grants for such areas as historical, cultural and environmental opportunities around town.

Lastly, we are mandated by the state (best practices) to install an Electric Vehicle (EV) charging station which must be on municipal property. This may be a great time to make this a grant priority.

## **It's All About Our Residents**

Working together with Borough staff, the Borough Council, and all our vendors has been such a wonderful experience all these years knowing that the collective benefit is for our residents. The common denominator is good communication and hard work.

## Veterans Day Celebration Features the Unveiling of Our Legacy Lawn

### Legacy Lawn Unveiling and Reception

It was a stunning day on November 11, 2023, as over 150 attendees gathered at the Middlesex Public Library front lawn for the unveiling of the first Middlesex Borough Legacy Lawn. The lawn was decorated with 116 signs of veterans from town from the 1940's until present day, noting their service, rank, achievements, and pictures.

Veterans in town were encouraged to fill out a Legacy Lawn form (found on the Library website and at the American Legion) to submit their information for inclusion in the Legacy Lawn. The Library will continue to accept applications on a rolling basis. Signs will be displayed

on the lawn from November 11 until December 11, and then put in storage for the Winter. They will return to the lawn (with any new additions as well) over Memorial Day weekend. Every year the Library will maintain the records and signs and add to the database of veterans for the Legacy Lawn.

Library Director Chrissy George, who started and managed the project with Reference Librarian Kristin Bennett, partnered with Helena Gaither, Commander of the American Legion John W Lupu Memorial Post 306 on the Legacy Lawn. The project was supported by the Middlesex Public Library Board of Trustees and Mayor and Council.

Speakers for the unveiling included

Library Director Chrissy George, Mayor John Madden, Library Board President Jim Benson, and First Vice Commander of the American Legion, Matt Adams.

“I’ve never been prouder to be a resident of Middlesex than I am today, because of this,” Adams noted. “What I love about today’s ceremony is that we’re able to say thank you.”

“Over the past two months, our Library staff have heard amazing, beautiful, moving stories of resilience, compassion, bravery, friendship, connection, and patriotism from the vets, their families, and loved ones, reflecting on the ultimate sacrifices made in the face

of war,” Director George said. “As a Library, our goal is to educate and to continue promoting lifelong learning, and what better way to do that than to encourage the sharing of these stories between families, between friends, creating spaces for history to grow and teach and pass down. After the ceremony, the American Legion’s annual Veteran’s Day event took place, followed by a reception inside the Legion.

## Happy Holidays

Safety is the main concern of Middlesex Borough during the winter months. The Public Works Department provides de-icing and snow removal whenever road conditions call for these services. Please remember snow removal is performed under emergency conditions and our drivers experience extended hours of work to provide safe roads for our residents. The following items are what our residents should be mindful of during the winter months:

- Do not deposit leaves in the roadway. Please make every attempt to keep storm drains clear of snow or leaves.
- Do not park on snow covered roads. Our police department will be enforcing this during snow events.
- Do not place garbage cans in the street. Objects in the roadway are our biggest deterrent

for efficient plowing operations.

- Remove all basketball posts that are in the road or within the right of way.
- Please do not blow snow onto plowed roadways. This creates hazardous road conditions.

During snow storms our first priority is to open main roads to provide safe access for emergency vehicles and maintain safe traffic. Plows will continue to clear all streets until every road is safe to travel. Also keep in mind that during these storms, vehicle breakdowns ultimately occur. Your patience during these snow events is greatly appreciated.

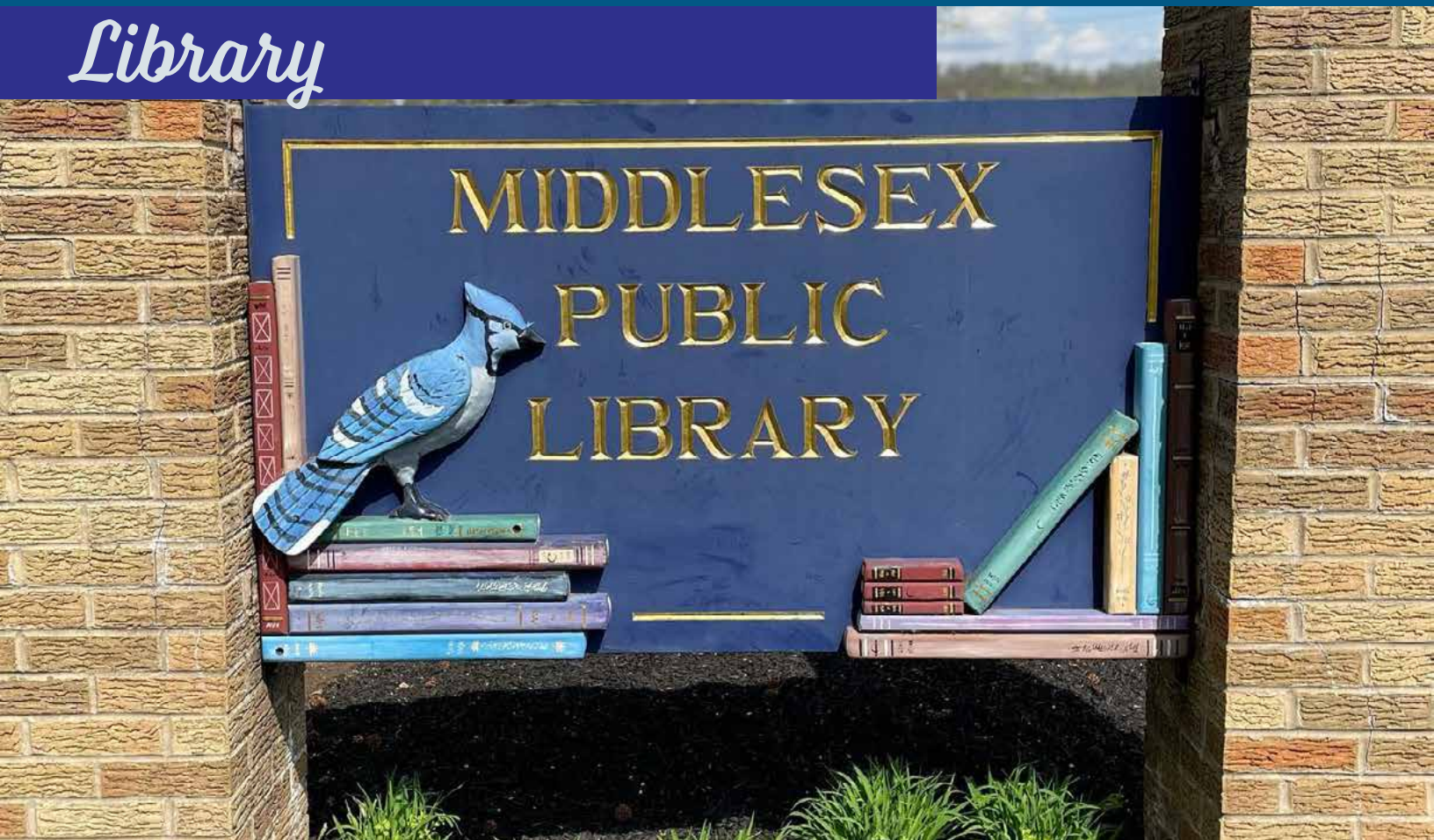

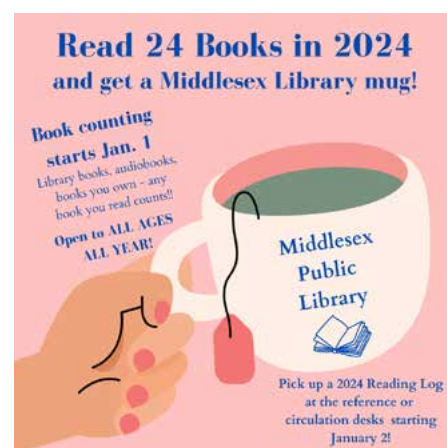

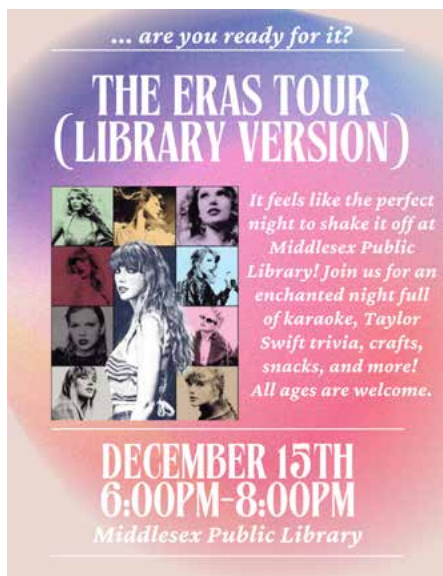

## Winter News and Events

The Middlesex Borough Police Department has had some very successful initiatives moving into the Winter months of 2023, including support of Wear Pink for a Cause, No Shave November, REPLENISH Food Drive, and National Prescription Take Back.

### Parking prohibited on Snow Covered Roadways

Whenever snow has fallen and the accumulation is such that it covers the street or highway, an emergency shall exist and no vehicle shall be parked on any street or highway or portion thereof. This prohibition shall remain in effect after the snow has ceased, until the street has been plowed sufficiently and to the extent that parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic. When forecasts suggest that snow will accumulate on our roadways, it is important to remove all vehicles from the roadways so that crews can clear the roads of snow and ice. Snowbound vehicles can choke roadways, preventing the passage of emergency vehicles and delaying the delivery of important - sometimes lifesaving - emergency services.



### New Jersey is Cracking Down on Impaired Driving

Nearly one-third of all fatal crashes in New Jersey are alcohol-related. Impaired drivers kill nearly 10,000 people on our nation's roads each year. If you plan to drink, have a non-drinking, designated driver. The Middlesex Police Department is joining the movement across the state - Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over.

## Ice & Snow - Remove it Before You Go

Remember to remove all ice and snow from your vehicle before driving, especially from the hood, windows and roof. It's the law in New Jersey! Motorists that fail to do so face fines of \$25 to \$75 for each offense, regardless of whether the ice and snow is dislodged from the vehicle. If flying ice or snow causes property damage or injury to others, motorists face fines of \$200 to \$1,000 for each offense.



## Removal of snow and ice from sidewalks

Residents shall remove all snow and ice from all portions of sidewalks down to their natural surfaces. The removal snow and ice must be accomplished within 12 hours of daylight after the snow has fallen and/or the ice has formed. Municipal ordinance requires that you remove snow and ice from sidewalks. Also, you can help the dedicated men and women of the Middlesex Fire Department by clearing snow and ice from on and around fire hydrants.



## Prevent Holiday Thefts

As the holidays approach, the Middlesex Police Department reminds residents to be extra careful and extra alert and to take measures to reduce opportunities for thieves. Avoid storing valuable items in vehicles. If you must store items in your vehicle, make sure that they are hidden from prying eyes and that the vehicle's doors are locked when it is unattended.

If you shop online, coordinate the delivery of packages for times when someone can be at home to accept them. You can also have packages delivered to your place of work or to a trusted neighbor. Take measures to keep yourself and your belongings safe. Be a good neighbor and keep an eye out for others, too. And, as always, promptly report any and all suspicious persons and suspicious activity to the Middlesex Police.

From time to time, circumstances necessitate the closure of schools and/or government buildings. Stay informed about closures and adjusted hours of operation.

## Beware of Scammers!

Scam activity is not affected by seasonal influences. Scammers know no boundaries. Fraudsters are relentless and are growing increasingly resourceful in the tactics that they employ. To avoid becoming a victim, please educate yourself on the scams that are currently the most popular:

### Romance Scam

The Romance Scam is becoming more and more prevalent. The victim is contacted on a dating application or website. The scammer, who often pretends to be serving in the military, fakes romantic interest in the victim and typically offers to pay off any debt that the victim may have. After the scammer tricks the victim into thinking that their debt has been paid off (it has not!), they will convince the victim to purchase large quantities of gifts cards and to send photographs containing the gift card numbers. After receiving the photographs, the suspect quickly activates and takes control of the funds on the cards.

### Social Security Administration Scam

Callers claiming to be affiliated with the Social Security Administration contact their victims by telephone and inform them that their personal information has been compromised. The scammers will then convince victims to purchase gift cards or to make wire transfers to help “secure” their financial assets. Similar scams exist involving individuals pretending to be associated



with the IRS and with PSE&G.

### Employment Scam

This scam begins with fraudsters reaching out to victims online who are seeking employment. After exchanging email correspondence, the scammer will tell the victim that they have been hired. The “company” will then send the victim checks, which they are instructed to deposit in their personal accounts. The victim is then told to use those funds to purchase equipment for their new position. In return, the scammer convinces the victim to send them wire transfers and/or mail them money orders. After doing so, the victim learns that the checks they received and deposited were fraudulent.

### Bail Money/Kidnapping Scam

This type of scammer contacts their victims by telephone and pretends that a relative has been arrested or kidnapped. The scammer then convinces the victim to send bail or ransom money, usually by wire

transfer, to secure their release.

### Online Marketplace Scam

EBay, Craigslist, Letgo, etc. are convenient and easy to use but offer unlimited possibilities to aspiring scammers. As you may have noticed, scammers typically request unusual methods of payment, such as gift cards and wire transfers. The online marketplace is no exception.

Please be wary when engaging with strangers online or over the telephone. Someone that you have never met in person but is seeking to send or receive money should not be trusted. The identity of anyone calling you claiming to be associated with a law enforcement, government, utilities company or civic organization can and should be verified.

## This winter, the Middlesex Borough Police Humane Law Enforcement Officers remind you to not forget about your pets!

- If possible, bring pets indoors.
- If it's not possible to bring them indoors, make sure that they have a dry enclosure with bedding on the floor.
- Position the enclosure so that the opening is not facing into the wind and, if possible, cover the opening.
- Make sure that pets have sufficient food and water available.
- Increase the food amount for pets kept outdoors to maintain their energy and fur health.
- Make sure that their water doesn't freeze.
- Salt and other chemicals used to melt ice can irritate a pet's paw. Wipe paws with a damp towel before your pet licks them.
- Antifreeze is a deadly poison. Promptly wipe up spills and store antifreeze out of reach.
- Wipe off your pet's paws, legs and underside to remove harmful de-icing chemicals.
- Check paws frequently for signs of cold weather injury or damage.



## Nixle Community Notifications and Alerts

Residents are urged to sign up to receive Nixle Alerts and Messages. Nixle allows the Police Department to send important, valuable community information directly to residents using the latest technology. Messages will be delivered by email, SMS/text message (cell phone), and over the World Wide Web. Notifications may include crime related alerts, traffic advisories and other relevant safety and community event information. Nixle also enables citizens to submit anonymous tips to the police department to aid in crime fighting efforts. 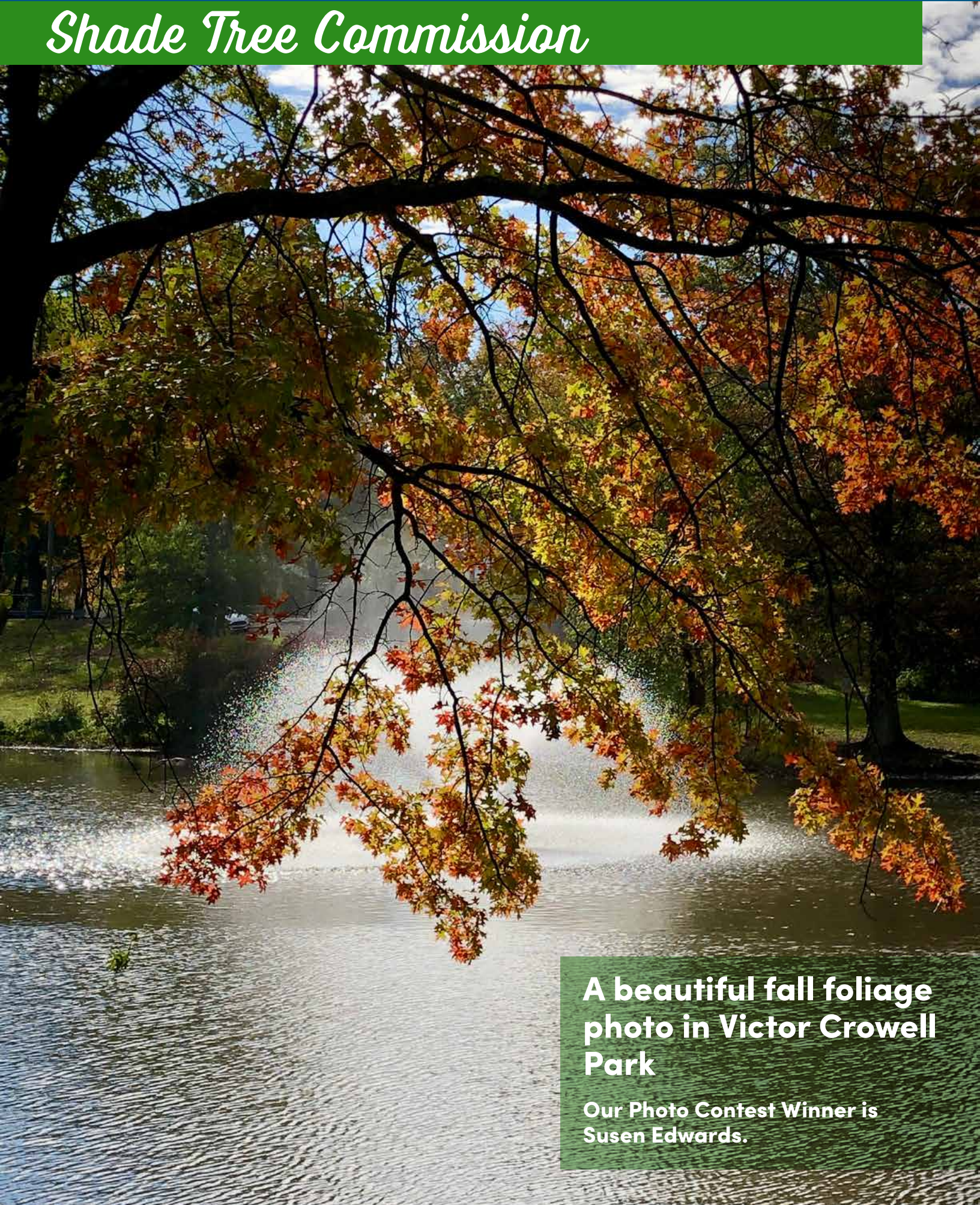

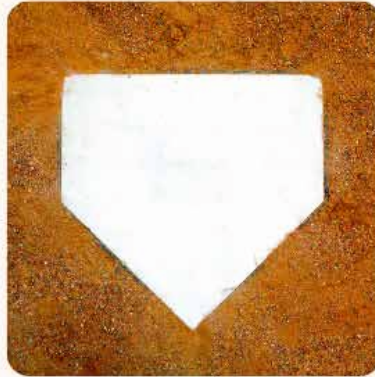

# Green Brook Flood Commission



## Flood Wall project on South Lincoln Ave Takes Shape

Meaningful flood reduction is making progress in our area – thanks to the tireless work and advocacy over the past 50 years from the Green Brook Flood Control Commission (GBFCC) and local residents, including Paul Woska and Mark Kranz, our GBFCC Commissioners.

Recent Congressional budgets awarded \$496 million for the construction of the Lower Basin and Stony Brook portions of Green Brook Flood Commission projects. With this commitment by the Federal government, projects are beginning to take shape.

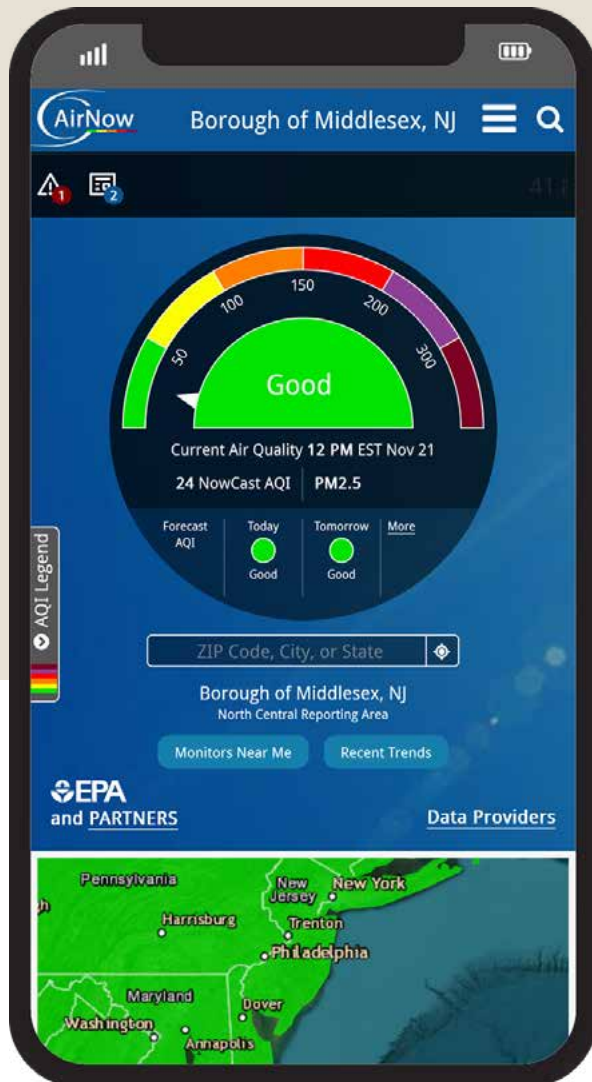
**In our Borough's geography, Segment C2 & H was awarded in March 2023 and construction began this month.**

- The base consists of two closure gates across S. Lincoln Avenue, one on either side of the brook.
- The northern gate will be in the gap where the completed Segment C2 floodwall is located.
- The south side gate, along with 300 or so feet of floodwall to be placed.
- The options consist of levees on both sides of the brook. The northern levee is to the west of S. Lincoln Avenue taking off where the Segment C2, Contract 1 floodwall ends.

- The two southern sections of levee will be on both sides of S. Lincoln Avenue.
- Two pump stations are included in the option.

South of the stream, on the west side of South Lincoln there will be a wall and flood gate installation. North of the stream, on the west side of South Lincoln a 2nd flood gate. These flood gates will both move toward the east and contain the bridge. During flooding when the gates are closed water will flow over the bridge. The pumping station will be up towards Denton Ave where the house was demolished.
