Mayor's Message

A Casual Day at Lake Creighton

Many of you who read my articles and follow my mayoral term know that I try to present a balanced overview on important Borough matters. Keeping folks informed and up-to-date like this maintains a sense of comfort and understanding how municipal issues are handled and what direction we take on each matter including a comprehensive transparency on all decisions.

After careful consideration, I broached an unlikely, unprecedented news development that quickly put Middlesex on the map. Yes, it is hard to believe that someone's pet took up residence in our historic Lake Creighton.

Public Safety Prioritized

For two weeks the search went on regarding the illusive reptile utilizing all the resources available to Chief Matthew Geist and the Middlesex Borough Police Department. Mr. Lenny Vidal, Supervisor of our Department of Public Works worked very closely with the police to put together an urgent plan in the spirit of public safety. The decision was made to close the entire park until this 4-foot alligator was found, captured and relocated. Many of the resources used included drones for observation, animal control officers in the water utilizing kayaks, waders and video surveillance equipment with constant police monitoring.

Organizations who participated include Mr. Lenny Vidal, Superintendent of the Department of Public Works, N.J. Department of Environmental Protection, Division of Fish and Wildlife Conservation Police, the Middlesex County Prosecutor's Office, Middlesex Borough Office of Emergency Management, Middlesex Borough Fire Department, Somerset Regional Animal Control and West Pest Management. My apologies if I left someone or some group out. Much of this information was extracted from the recent Police Department Press Release.

The sheer number of these resources utilized should give us pause regarding the intention of the release of an "exotic" pet by an irresponsible individual. Such a reckless act may have caused serious injury to a pet, child or adult. In *continued, next page*

Alligator: A Timeline AUGUST 23: THE SIGHTING



"...The Middlesex Police Department investigated a report that there was a small alligator in the Ambrose Brook, which was confirmed. The reptile submerged and has not been seen since. The alligator is estimated to be approximately 3-4 feet in length. We are working closely with the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection Conservation Police to capture and relocate the reptile..."

THROUGH EARLY SEPTEMBER: THE SEARCH



"...With help from our partners, we have continued attempts to locate, capture, and relocate the alligator... Observation through drones, animal control officers in the water by means of kayak and waders, video surveillance, and patrol officer monitoring have not positively identified the presence of the reptile in over seven days within the waterways in which it was previously observed. Although this likely indicates that the alligator is no longer in the area, anyone who observes the alligator should not approach or otherwise interact with it and immediately contact the Middlesex Borough Police Department..." addition, because of this event alone, the enormous amount of planning and expense was probably very significant and unnecessary.

Got 'Em!

On Thursday night, September 7, 2023 at 10:10 pm, Piscataway Police responded to a call by a resident in the area of 2nd Ave., Piscataway where the alligator was spotted in the roadway. The reptile was quickly captured and ultimately relocated to the Cape May County Zoo.

Although Lake Creighton and Victor Crowell Park are now open, fishing and swimming are still off limits. Please observe the posted signs there for your safety.

This is a great example of a very efficiently coordinated effort by many to attain a positive resolution.

From the Mayor

The Summer of Our Discontent

Approaching the ending of our summer plans and activities, it seems that there were more things that we wanted to accomplish. Even with the best laid plans, this epilogue becomes the very reprise of each passing summer.

How do we break this persistent cycle? Do we attempt to plan more efficiently or leave off some of these items from our bucket list? I have always tried to live by the old adage; "if you fail to plan then you will plan to fail".

This conundrum seems to pervade both outside as well as inside of Borough Hall. In other words, some positive and some not-so-positive events do occur every year. The similarities are striking.

OUR PLANS AND THEIR STATUS

For instance, although years in the making, our streetscape,

along Bound Brook Road, plan is finally coming to fruition.

On the flip side, we have spent many hours in conversation, meetings and emails attempting to resolve the erosion problem with the folks on Heather Lane. I call this an urgent environmental emergency (one of two lingering in the Borough). The agencies that initially offered to help were FEMA, Army Corp, Green Brook Flood Control Commission, DEP, State OEM and the list goes on. One by one they all bowed out. I have called Senator Bramnick to come out and take the tour. He was quite surprised to see the damage. Next, I called Congresswoman Bonnie Watson Coleman to also come out to see the problem. Hopefully she will visit soon.

I urge residents to contact your representatives to remedy this issue as one house has already been condemned and if nothing is done, the domino effect will claim the other homes. I believe that federal funds can be available in this case. Unfortunately, the Borough cannot get involved with private property.

MORE GOOD NEWS, BAD NEWS

On a positive note, we have recently purchased the Foreign Express property at 302 Union Ave. The vision is that this will be a nice addition to enhance the Victor Crowell Park entrance, including parking and rest rooms.

On the flip side, we are still facing the ecological and environmental damage of our historic Creighton Lake, which occurred when on August 1, 2021, a major N.J. American Water main burst, bringing to our lake much debris and chemical discharge causing a massive fish kill and extremely high E. Coli contamination (in my opinion). One month later we were hit with storm Ida, further exacerbating the damage. This is now a "swirling vortex of entropy). N.J. American Water has absolved all responsibility for the damage. Again, Senator Bramnick took the tour to view the ongoing problems with our lake.

The road to success in these two problem areas, in my opinion, is to scour every possible related resource and inundate them with persistence until resolved.

Promoting CPR Literacy

Office of Emergency Management Emphasizes CPR Literacy at Varsity Football Halftimes

With excitement mounting, the large crowd began to arrive in anticipation of the opening game for the Middlesex Borough Blue Jay Varsity Football Team of the 2023 season, Friday night September 15, 2023.

On hand was MedicZero to perform free, individual (3-5) minute presentations of Bystander CPR.

The Middlesex Borough OEM and Middlesex Public Library want to emphasize the importance of CPR Literacy to all athletes, coaches, staff, and spectators. The goal of this program is to empower bystanders with the confidence and basic knowledge to recognize and to ACT when cardiac emergencies occur.

Thanks go out to Athletic Director Mike O'Donnell for supporting this program and the invitation to bring this vital program to the Whole Community.

The Middlesex Boro Office of Emergency Management in Collaboration with the Middlesex Public Library arranged to have (3-5) minute, Individual presentations of Bystander, No Breath, Hands Only CPR offered to the public on site, free of charge. The presentations will be at each of the four Home Games including the upcoming September 29th, October 6th and October 20th.

Middlesex Borough OEM, in collaboration with the Library, began the "You Are The Help Until Help Arrives" campaign in 2022 offering our Borough Residents opportunities to experience Bystander CPR at community events and taking full courses in CPR and Bleeding Control, free of charge, part of the "Whole Community" approach to Preparedness. The focus is to educate and inform our residents and develop a shared responsibility and ultimately a culture of Preparedness. This requires involvement of everyone –not just the government.

We are thrilled to work with the very capable and passionate non-profit MedicZero with respect to our sponsored programs.

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) can happen at any Time. It is a life threatening emergency that occurs when the heart suddenly stops beating. Survival from SCA depends on the quick actions of people nearby.







Breast Cancer Awareness

Borough Employees Partner with Dance for the Cure to "Tie the Town Pink"

For the past several years during October, Dance for the Cure has organized a Tie the Town Pink awareness campaign in recognition of Breast Cancer Awareness month.

Fall Leaf Pick up

Grass/leaves will only be picked up in paper biodegradable bags. Plastic bags will NOT be picked up. Grass/leaves can also be taken to the Recycling Center. Leaves cannot be raked or blown to the curb or roadway.

LEAF BAGS AVAILABLE: Residents will be entitled to 10 bags which will be available for pickup at the recycle center in November.

School Is In Session

Students and Staff of the Middlesex Borough Public Schools need us all to be aware of School Zone Speed limits around all of our schools. Be mindful of students walking and crossing our roadways with designated Crossing Guards. Be cautious of stopped school buses and obey applicable traffic laws, including N.J.S.A. 39:4-128.1, Improper Passing of a School Bus.

Pedestrian And School Traffic

Traffic signals on Route 28 at the intersections with Lorraine Avenue and John F. Kennedy Drive are primary crossing points for students and parents walking to school. Please be aware of pedestrian traffic and Crossing Guard directions when around our schools.

Buckle Up!



Under state law, drivers and passengers must all wear seat belts, and failure to do so for those in the front seat is a primary offense, meaning police can pull a car over if someone up front isn't wearing one. The fine for not wearing a seat belt in is \$46.

Don't Drive Distracted

Distracted driver remains a major contributing factor in motor vehicle crashes and injuries on the state's roadways. Over the five year period



between 2015-2019, New Jersey's roadways experienced 709,061 motor vehicle crashes, in which distracted driving was a contributing factor. In those crashes, there

were 164,334 reported injuries and 981 fatalities. It is important to recognize and address the dangers posed by distracted drivers.

Over the five year period from 2015–2019, in Middlesex Borough, there were 1,561 crashes.

Distracted driving was a contributing factor in 1,012 of those crashes, which accounted for 64.83% of all crashes in Middlesex Borough. To reduce the number of distracted driving motor vehicle crashes within

Middlesex Borough and reduce the amount of distracted drivers in and around school zones beginning October 1, 2022 and extending through September 30, 2023, Middlesex Police Officers will be enforcing Distracted Driving laws in an effort to educate our community and reduce the occurrences of distracted driving related crashes.

Burglars And Theft

Unlocked vehicles are popular targets for opportunistic thieves. The modern convenience of key fobs also makes vehicles more susceptible to theft when the fobs are left in vehicles. PLEASE lock your vehicles at all times when they are unattended and keep valuables stored out of view of prying eyes. Burglars often pose as solicitors, enabling them to approach homes to determine if anyone is present, without arousing suspicion. For this reason, the Borough of Middlesex requires that all solicitors obtain license before engaging in such activity. If you suspect that someone is soliciting without a license, please report them to the police.

Internet Exchange Zone

The Middlesex Police Department has established an Internet Exchange Zone in the parking lot at police headquarters. The zone is monitored by a dedicated video surveillance camera. The goal is to create a place that promotes safer transactions between individuals making sales, purchases or exchanges with total strangers.

Nixle Community Alerts

Nixle is a free communication system that connects residents to the agencies that protect, serve and communicate with them. Residents are urged to sign up to receive Nixle Alerts and Messages. Nixle allows the Police Department to send important, valuable community information directly to residents using the latest technology. Messages will be delivered by email, SMS/text message (Standard text message rates apply), and over the World Wide Web. Notifications may include crime related alerts, traffic advisories and other relevant safety and community event information.

Preparedness is Essential to Your Safety

Middlesex Borough's Office of Emergency Management and FEMA want you to be aware that Preparedness is a shared responsibility. Taking a Whole Community approach we strive to educate and empower our residents to prepare and respond to emergencies which include natural and man-made disasters.

Disasters are unexpected by nature. By creating an emergency plan and resources ahead of time, you can reduce the confusion and chaos during an actual emergency. This article has a focus on our Senior Community and their caregivers. However, our whole community will find helpful information here!

- Assess your needs. If you have medications that need refrigeration, rely on mobility or assistive devices or have a pet you'll need to understand how these variables will factor into what you'll need to stay safe in a disaster or emergency.
- Make a plan. Once you assess your needs, you can tailor your plans to make sure your needs are met. This can include building a kit that includes extra medication, having a way to store medications in an emergency and planning for your pets or service animals. If you're an older adult or work with and support older adult communities visit Ready.gov/older-adults and Ready.gov/es/adultos-mayores for resources.

Engage your support network. Reaching out to family, friends and neighbors can help you build a support network that can support you before, during and after a disaster or emergency. Share each aspect of your emergency plan with everyone in your group, including a friend or relative in another area who would not be impacted by the same emergency who can help if necessary. Make sure everyone knows how you plan to evacuate your home or workplace and where you will go in case of a disaster. Make sure that someone in your personal support network has an extra key to your home and knows where you keep your emergency supplies. Practice your plan with those who have agreed to be part of your personal support network.

As an older adult, you may have specific needs after a

disaster. Assess your needs and take simple, low-cost steps that help you get better prepared.

- Disasters could affect your area, which could call for an evacuation, and when to shelter in place, and plan what you need to do in both cases.
- Keep a NOAA Weather Radio tuned to your local emergency station and monitor TV and radio for warnings about severe weather in your area.
- Download the FEMA app and get weather alerts from the National Weather Service for up to five different locations anywhere in the United States.

Plan Ahead

- Plan how you will <u>communicate</u> if you have a communications need.
- Plan for <u>food</u>, <u>water</u>, and <u>essentials</u> for you and <u>pets</u> <u>or service animals</u>. Research pet-friendly evacuation centers.
- S Plan for your transportation if you need help evacuating.
- Include items that <u>meet your individual needs</u>, such as medicines, medical supplies, batteries and chargers, in your <u>emergency supply kit</u>.
- S Plan how you will have your assistive devices with you during an evacuation.
- Make copies of Medicaid, Medicare, and other insurance cards.

Make a Plan

Determine any special assistance you may need and include plans for that assistance in your emergency plan. For more detailed information, visit our page on <u>planning for people with disabilities</u>.

- Create a support network of family, friends and others who can assist you during an emergency. Make an <u>emergency plan</u> and practice it with them.
- Make sure at least one person in your support network has an extra key to your home, knows where you keep your emergency supplies, and knows how to use lifesaving equipment or administer medicine.
- If you undergo routine treatments administered by a clinic or hospital, find out their emergency plans and work with them to identify back-up service providers.
- Don't forget your pets or service animals. Not all shelters accept pets, so plan for alternatives. Consider asking loved ones or friends outside of your immediate area if they can help with your animals.

Get Your Benefits Electronically

A disaster can disrupt mail service for days or weeks. If you depend on Social Security or other regular benefits, switching to electronic payments is a simple, important way to protect yourself financially before disaster strikes. It also eliminates the risk of stolen checks. The U.S. Department of the Treasury recommends two safer ways to get federal benefits:
